Thoroughly read the instruction manual that comes with the car seat to ensure you install your particular seat in the right place in the back seat, at the right tightness, at the right angle and so on. After you've installed the seat, be sure to <u>get it checked</u> by a local Child Passenger Safety Technician.

Invest in a smartphone you can count on.

A high-powered smartphone can assist you when you're on the road. These phones have GPS and access to traffic reports and are a necessity if your car ever breaks down and you need to call for assistance. You can also use many models hands-free so you can concentrate on what's in front of you. If your smartphone is more than a few years old, it may be worth investing in a new model. For instance, the Samsung Galaxy S10 is lightweight, durable, and ultra-fast, and it can read content out loud when you have messages and calls while driving. If you're an iPhone user, the iPhone 11 is a high-performing model that will send callers an automatic message that lets them know you're on the road and can't talk.

Take your vehicle in for regular maintenance.

Keep records of your <u>maintenance appointments</u> so that you always know when it's time to take your vehicle in. Learn how to practice basic upkeep.
